GROUND BREAKING CEREMONIES



The ground breaking ceremony for our long awaited Lakewood Shopping Center was held on Tuesday, April 21. Represented were Dick's Markets, Sunnyvale Civic Leaders, the LVRA and Lakewood Shell Service. The first unit which is now under construction will consist of the following: Liquor store, Coffee Shop, Beauty Shop, Barber Shop, Dry Cleaning establishment, and Dick's Market. The 18,000 sq. ft. market is scheduled to open on August 20, with the others following shortly thereafter. The second unit, which will be built in the near future, is hoped to have a drug store, variety store, hardware store, and medical-dental unit.

Mr. Anderson, who represented Shell Service at the Ground Breaking Ceremony for the shopping center on April 21, said in a statement to the press that " he was happy to see the shopping center underway". The Shell Station is actually the first unit to be built, as it was included in the plans with the other units.

Let me congratulate all of you that voted in the last city election. Believe me, it really took courage for only 140 people out of at least 3,000 eligible voters to turnout.

Well, it isn't all black . . . our gas station is open and going strong, our Shopping Center is now under construction, the city is working on the half-streets and the connecting of Lakewood Drive and at least two other projects are in the planning stage . . . so we are coming of age.

Only Lawrence Station Road remains a big problem, and that is only because the City and the Contractor cannot reach an agreement. (The construction of Lawrence Station Rd. was placed #1 on the city's priority list of projects to be completed this year by the City Council last month.) Now I admire both the City and the Contractor for sticking to their guns, but . . . the only ones that are getting hurt in the process are you and I as residents of Lakewood Village. If you have had enough of this, please let your Unit Representative know your feelings about this matter. I'd like to leave you with these suggestions: Keep your children out of the Shopping Center construction area to speed their progress and to safeguard your children - and, support the proposal for residential zoning between Lakewood Village and Orchard Gardens.

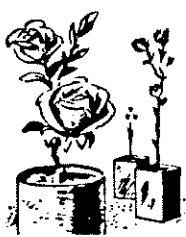

Facilities at the Mountain Park are limited since all initial development was restricted mainly to donated labor and materials.

Twenty-five (25) picnic units with picnic tables and barbecue stoves are now available.

Restroom facilities consist of two (2) pit toilets. New rest room units will be built and ready for the 1959 summer season.

Water is piped to the edge of the major picnic area. The source of water and outlets are checked and approved by the County Health Department.

A fire circle for evening camp fires is located near the picnic area.

Hiking on established trails to outlooks with a panoramic view of northern Santa Clara County (including Sunnyvale) is an activity enjoyed by many.

At this time there isn't any playground equipment, but natural obstacles of rocks and trees afford a challenge for active play to all age groups.
