EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

LONE -- Yes, a look at any city map will quickly show you Lakewood Village is set apart from the city and all business districts by Bayshore, Alviso-Mt. View Rd. and Calabasas Creek. These barriers will grow when these roads develop into Freeways and make L.V. inaccessible to all but auto traffic. When this comes about L.V. will have to have all of the necessities of life (Gro., Drug, Hardware stores to name a few), if it is to survive. Would you send your child across Bayshore for a loaf of bread? The land for our shopping center has been sitting idle for over a year now. What's holding up the developers? The only reason evidently is they don't think there are enough people living in L.V. to support a complete shopping center. If this is the case, the LVRA Exec. Bd. hope each and every resident of L.V. will make his wishes known to the city, urging approval for the developer's plans to construct 2,000 units between L.V. and our sister-orphaned subdivision to the West, Orchard Gardens.

Approval of this development would enable construction of more schools and the greater population would justify a Complete Community Development which we are sure the City Fathers had in mind when they approved construction of Lakewood Village.

LIFE, LIBERTY AND RESPONSIBILITY.

Editorial by Ernst W. Smith, Sr.

Today as in 1776 and in every beginning we are faced with the inevitable responsibility of laying a foundation which will endure. The plans evolved and the action taken by our City Council, now and in the immediate future, will greatly determine the life or death of Sunnyvale as a progressive, well-balanced city.

The responsibility of determining policy for many thousands of persons placed on the shoulders of seven citizens must be a matter of vital concern. In the words of President Wilson given on July 4, 1914 at Independence Hall, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, "Liberty does not consist, my fellow citizens, in mere general declaration of the rights of man. It consists in the translation of those declarations into definite action. Therefore, standing here where the declaration was adopted, reading its businesslike sentences, we ought to ask ourselves what there is in it for us. There is nothing in it for us unless we can translate it into the terms of our own conditions and of our own lives. We must reduce it to what the lawyers call a bill of particulars. It contains a bill of particulars, but the bill of particulars of 1776. If we would keep it alive, we must fill it with a bill of particulars of the year 1914.

The task to which we have constantly to readdress ourselves is the task of proving that we are worthy of the men who drew this great declaration and know what they would have done in our circumstances. Patriotism consists in some very practical things - practical in that they belong to the life of every day, that they wear no extraordinary distinction about them, that they are connected with commonplace duty. The way to be patriotic in America is not only to love America but to love the duty that lies nearest to our hand and know that in performing it we are serving our country."

**BACK OF ALL TRADES**

This section will be giving helpful information to you on different handyman techniques each issue. The question answered will depend on you. Send your queries to "Jack", 1140 Candlewood Court, and I'll try to answer them.

As to some of the questions asked recently:

Can we put our fence posts into the ground and hold them with soil?

No!...not if you want a solid fence. In this type of soil, the posts should be packed in solid with gravel. Better yet, dig a hole twice the diameter and pour around the sunken post a collar of concrete (mixed 5 gravel, 3 sand, and 1 cement.)

How soon should we paint our house?

If the house is new, don't wait more than two years. This should eliminate the use of a primer coat on the wood. However, the stucco should be given two coats....first a surface sealer, then a coat of latex stucco paint or good oil stucco paint.

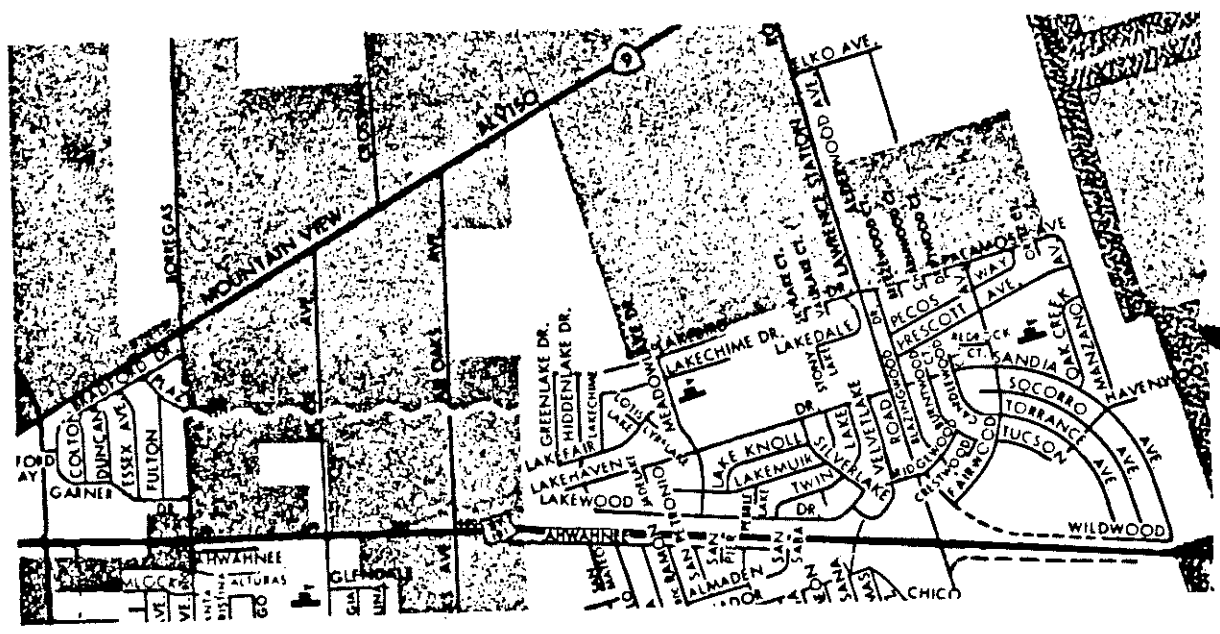

GREEN THUMB (Softwood Cuttings)

April is one of the best months for taking and rooting softwood cuttings. Softwood is the stems of plants that remain green and soft the year around such as geraniums, or carnations, or the green wood now forming on many deciduous shrubs such as roses, viburnum, chrysanthemums, etc. The best cuttings are taken from unblooming side shoots, from 3 to 6" down from the tip, with a sharp knife though much longer cuttings are sometimes taken to produce larger plants in a shorter period of time. At least one leaf should be left near the tip of the cutting, and the cut end should be placed in a rooting medium such as builder's sand, in a warm, shaded spot, and kept moist at all times. Roots should form on most plants from 2-8 weeks, at which time transplanting is in order.

Coffee cans, baby food cans, milk cans, etc., make good containers for these cuttings while they are forming roots. Willows, marigolds and many houseplants may be rooted by placing the cut ends in a jar of water.
